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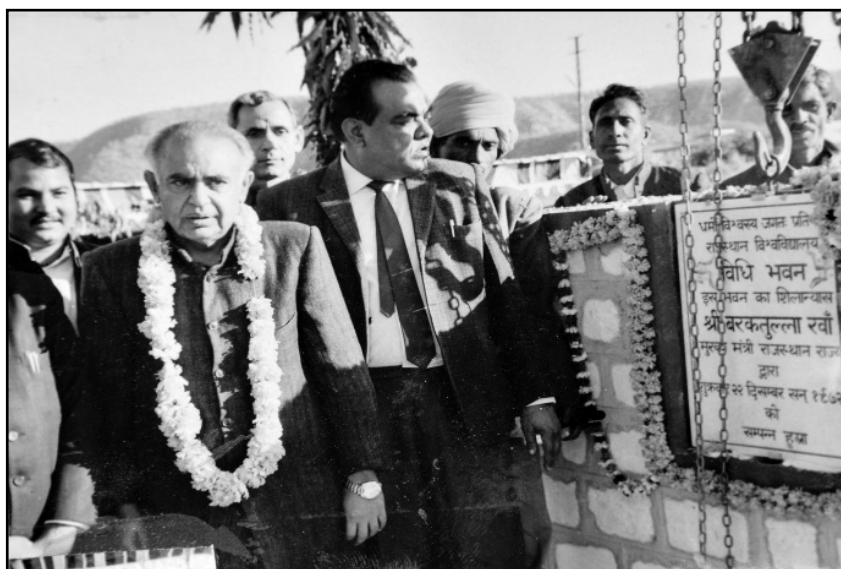
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## Genesis & Evolution: University of Rajasthan

On the 8th of January 1947, the University of Rajputana appeared as a nascent star on the educational horizon of pre-independent India. The efforts for a separate University for the Rajputana State were initiated as early as 1921 when the Act for the Allahabad University was passed. The Act prescribed for separation of Intermediate classes from the Degree classes as a condition for affiliation, which meant more expenditure for the then colleges at Jaipur, Jodhpur and Ajmer, the only colleges then imparting University education and affiliated to Allahabad University. The location of the University became a controversial issue. The question was considered in all its aspects at a meeting called by the Agent to the Governor General in Rajputana and attended by the ruling Princes and Chiefs at Mt. Abu on 20 June 1924.

After a gap of nearly two decades, the efforts were again initiated in 1942 by Sir Mirza Ismail, the then Prime Minister of Jaipur, who appointed J.C. Rollo as Special Education Officer for this purpose. Sir Mirza Ismail and his successor in office Sir V.T. Krishnamachari took the initiative of holding talks with the representatives of Udaipur, Jodhpur, Bikaner, Alwar, and Jaipur in December 1946. They agreed to the establishment of a University at Jaipur and on January 8, 1947, legislation was promulgated and the colleges in the State formally federated into the University of Rajputana, which came into existence in July the same year.

Dr. G. S. Mahajani, Principal of Ferguson College, Poona (now Pune), was appointed the first Vice-Chancellor of the University and was an ideal person in many respects. He was a member of the Servants of India Society and was elected as a fellow of prominent institutions such as the National Academy of Sciences, India, and the Cambridge Philosophical Society at St John's College, Cambridge.



The University was allocated an annual grant of Rs.2.5 lacs by the participating States of Rajputana. The remarkable thing is that the States made it clear that the "acceptance of the grant will in no way detract from the autonomy of the University and its freedom to organise its teaching and administration as to embody in them the highest conception of University life."

Shri C. Rajagopalachari, the first Governor General of free India, had a very clear idea of the importance of the universities and their dignity. Addressing the students of Loyola College, Madras in August 1948, he advocated "we have to maintain the highest standards for our universities. The pressure of democracy may be allowed to bear on anything else, but not on the standard of education."

The foundation stone of the University Campus was laid by Shri C. Rajagopalachari on February 20, 1949. He concluded his address with the words: "Nothing can be achieved unless we learn to be good and correct and self-disciplined and cultivate self-restraint and that, which is called dharma in our beautiful language."

The jurisdiction of this University at that time extended over the entire Rajputana State with the exception of Ajmer-Merwara. In the beginning, it was only an affiliating University with twenty-two colleges in different parts of the state.

The University of Rajasthan has acquired the status of University with Potential for Excellence. Over the years, the University has redefined itself by meeting the challenges of changing trends in the educational system and has made a significant contribution in the field of higher education.

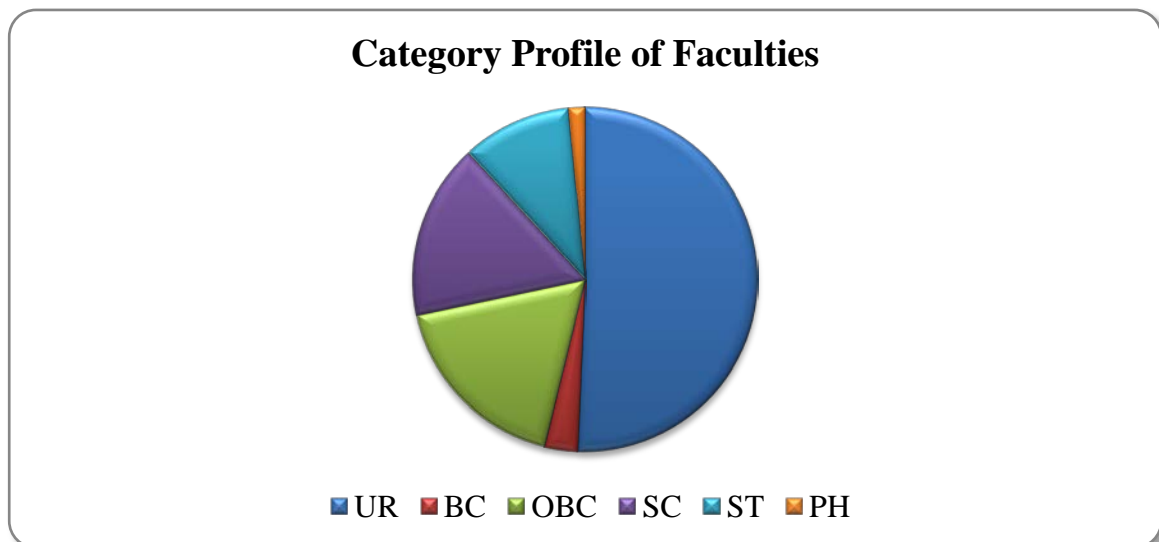
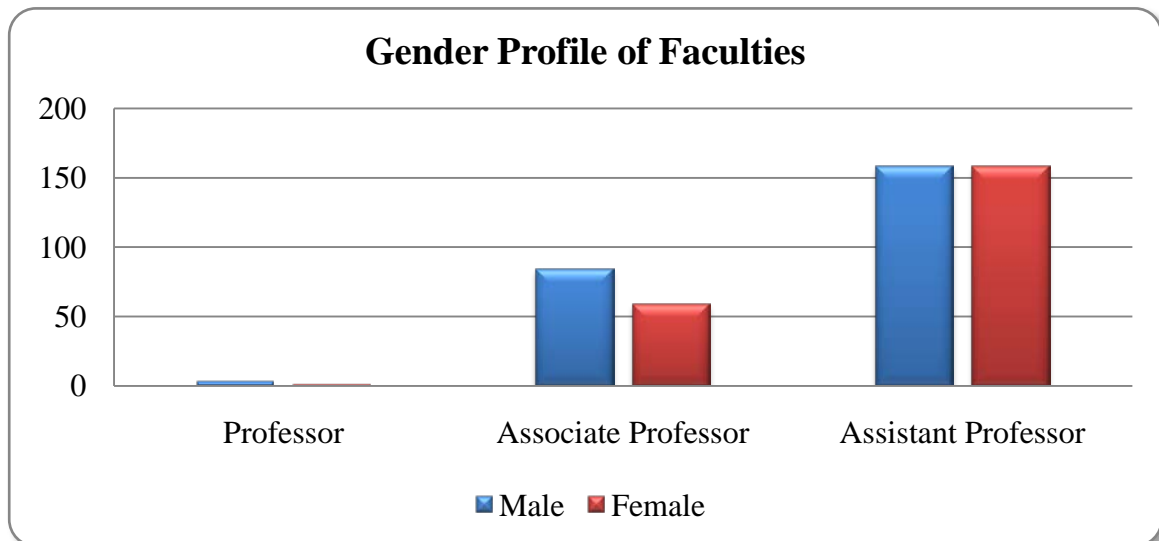

- **Income from Certificates and Revaluation:** Income is also derived from issuing migration and provisional certificates, and from the revaluation of answer books.
- **Hostel and Non-Teaching Departments:** Revenues are generated from hostel services and various non-teaching departments.
- **Miscellaneous Receipts:** Additional funds come from garden income, sale of forms, recovery and various other sources.
- **Government Grants:** UoR receives substantial grants from the State Government, along with specific funding from the central government agencies.

### **Financial Grants for Research Innovation and Development-**

UOR has been the recipient of numerous significant grants aimed at enhancing research, infrastructure, and academic quality:

- **Rashtriya Uchchatar Shiksha Abhiyan (RUSA):** The Ministry of Human Resource Development (MHRD) and the Government of Rajasthan have approved multiple grants under the RUSA program. Notably, UoR received Rs. 35.00 Crores for research innovation and Rs. 7.00 Crores for the Faculty Improvement Programme.
- **United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF):** A grant of Rs. 22.89 Lakhs was awarded to the State Centre of Excellence for Nutrition within the University's Department of Home Science.
- **Biotechnology Industry Research Assistance Council (BIRAC):** Financial support of Rs. 2.2 Crores was provided for establishing a University Innovation Cluster in Biotechnology at the Centre for Converging Technologies.

- **Centre for Excellence in Nanotechnology:** The state government, through DST, Rajasthan, allocated Rs. 13 Crores for this initiative, enhancing UoR's research capabilities in nanotechnology.
- **University with Potential for Excellence (UPE):** UoR was recognized among the top 15 Indian universities with potential for excellence, receiving a grant of Rs. 50 Crores from the UGC to bolster academic and research activities.
- **UGC, ICSSR, DST, DBT, ICAR, CSIR, IUAC, NCW** etc. also provided project-specific grants to UoR.

### **Financial Management and Resource Utilization**

UoR's financial management system is designed to ensure the efficient and transparent utilization of funds. The Finance Committee, led by the Vice-Chancellor, plays a crucial role in examining budget estimates, reviewing accounts, and advising on financial matters. The University follows a rigorous budgeting process, where a committee of senior faculty prepares budget estimates based on departmental needs. The Finance Committee scrutinizes these estimates, ensuring they align with the University's strategic objectives.

UoR adheres to a detailed accounts manual that outlines rules for expenditure, ensuring transparency and efficiency. Funds are allocated to various heads, including salaries, examination expenses, maintenance, and research grants, all monitored through a centralized system to prevent overspending.

Through a strategic approach to fund mobilization and resource management, UoR continues to support its mission of academic excellence, research innovation, and infrastructural development.

### **The institution regularly conducts internal and external financial audits**

The University of Rajasthan has a robust financial auditing system in place to ensure transparency, accountability, and compliance with financial regulations. The university conducts both internal and external audits to maintain accurate financial records and ensure proper utilization of resources across its operations.

The budget of the University is prepared in accordance with the provisions outlined in Volume 3, Chapter 48, Ordinance 385 and 385A, with audits conducted under various heads, including the maintenance budget, income and expenditure of constituent colleges, specific activities, and accounts related to sponsored projects sanctioned by funding agencies like UGC, MHRD, SAP, DST, and ICSSR.

The internal audit system at the university is overseen by an Audit Cell, comprised of permanently deputed accounts service employees from the Government of Rajasthan. This cell ensures that the financial processes across constituent colleges and departments comply with regulatory guidelines and that any discrepancies are promptly addressed. A separate cell also ensures compliance with audit reports from the Accountant General (AG) and the Local Fund Audit Department (LFAD).

**Types of audits** are conducted at the University of Rajasthan to ensure that financial transactions are transparent and properly documented:

- i. CA Audit:** A team of chartered accountants is hired to conduct internal audits, prepare annual accounts, and file GST and income tax returns.
- ii. Internal Audit:** A team of auditors deputed by the state government under the supervision of the university's Financial Advisor conducts audits of all university units. This team reviews all financial transactions to ensure compliance and accuracy.
- iii. AG Audit:** The audit team from the Accountant General's office visits the university annually to audit its financial accounts and other related matters.
- iv. LFAD Audit:** The Local Fund Audit Department, Government of Rajasthan, conducts an annual audit of the financial accounts of the university's colleges and departments.

Additionally, the university has a strong external audit mechanism. Each payment is subject to pre-audit by a resident government auditor, ensuring that no payment is processed without prior verification. The utilization certificates for grants received from various funding agencies are certified by an authorized audit officer. Any objections raised during the audit are addressed before payments are finalized, ensuring timely resolution of financial discrepancies.

To resolve audit objections, the university has a mechanism in place where the concerned units provide the necessary documents and explanations to settle any discrepancies. Regular communication between the departments and the audit teams ensures that audit reports are promptly addressed and any issues are rectified in compliance with regulations.

Overall, the University of Rajasthan's audit process involves multiple layers of checks and balances, including internal audits by government-deputed auditors, external audits by AG and LFAD teams, and pre-audit processes to ensure transparency. This comprehensive auditing system ensures that all financial transactions are thoroughly reviewed, compliant with regulations, and properly documented, fostering financial accountability and integrity within the university.

- b. **LED Bulbs:** Wastage and profligacy of energy are prevented by the use of LED bulbs and pasting stickers like "Save electricity", and "Switch off lights/fans when not in use" in the classrooms, hostels, seminar halls, administrative block, etc.
- c. **Solar Water Heater:** One hundred solar water heaters installed in the boys' and girls' hostels are being efficiently maintained every year. Installation of solar water heaters has proved to be an efficient way to meet the everyday requirements of the students without incurring any fuel costs.

**Green Building Practices:** Several new constructions and renovations within the university are designed with eco-friendly practices in mind. The incorporation of green building principles, such as using energy-efficient materials and ensuring natural ventilation, contributes to the campus's overall sustainability efforts.

A guard room is also strategically placed on the premises, providing round-the-clock surveillance and protection

The nursery is not only a centre of horticultural excellence but also an economically significant enterprise. Its annual income ranges from 6 to 8 lakh rupees, reflecting its role as a major player in the local plant market. By offering a wide array of plants at competitive prices, the nursery maintains an extensive and cost-effective inventory, making it an attractive destination for plant buyers and enthusiasts.

One of the highlights of the nursery's annual calendar is its prestigious chrysanthemum exhibition. This highly anticipated event, held once a year, garners considerable attention from the community and beyond. It is graced by distinguished guests, including the Governor, Ministers, and the Vice Chancellor, who often serve as the chief guest. The exhibition showcases the nursery's commitment to horticultural excellence and its role in promoting plant cultivation and appreciation within the campus, enhancing its reputation as a hub of botanical innovation and community engagement.

### C. ANANDAM PROGRAMME

#### ANANDAM PROGRAM

The "Anandam" program has been introduced in the University of Rajasthan as a compulsory subject in the curriculum of all UG/PG degree courses of annual and semester scheme from academic session 2020-21 onwards. The Anandam program aims to sensitize the students towards challenges and issues prevalent today in society and to instill the joy of giving in young people turning them into responsible citizens who will build a meaningful future for a better nation. The course has been implemented in all University teaching departments/centres, constituent colleges and affiliated colleges of the University of Rajasthan to make students aware of their role and responsibilities towards society. The course is part of the curriculum in each year. Anandam Program IN annual scheme courses and each semester of semester scheme courses has been incorporated with 30 minutes/day slot in time-table. During the year/semester, students are required to engage in individual and group community service activities by recording daily one act of goodness and undertaking community service projects as a group activity. For group activity, the students are required to take up projects outside College/University hours with NGOs /Govt. / social service organisations. Individual and group activities are to be suggested/approved and monitored by mentors allotted by their college/department. Every year, with the active participation of students the 'Anandam Day' is to be celebrated by the department/college in which motivational lectures/movies/webinars/interactive sessions may be organised. Guidelines for the

implementation of this unique compulsory subject 'Anandam' and the details of the evaluation of projects, marking scheme, etc. are available on the University website.

**Some Group Activities Suggested under the Anandam Program for evaluation as Group Community Project** Adopt an area/colony/office to organize and monitor Water and Power saving Campaigns. To teach people the value of natural resources through slogans, posters, etc.

- Adopt an area/colony/office to train people about plastic/organic waste disposal.
- Form a group to ensure that injured and sick cows and other animals in your area are taken care of.
- Adopt an area/colony to rectify issues related to water /electricity/ waste disposal/ road safety/pollution, etc.
- Create a book/food/clothes/mobile/equipment bank and distribute it to the needy.
- To monitor unauthorized cutting of trees and related issues. Engage in massive plantation and afforestation programs.
- Adopt local heritage sites or spots of tourist interest and work for their restoration and publicity on tourist guide maps.
- Coordinate with hospitals / NGOs and organise medical check-up camps for children/women in poor localities.
- Form drug/alcohol de-addiction help-groups and motivate people.
- Organize Vocational Skill Training Programs in juvenile jails and women's homes.
- Form a group to help workers/house maids to make cooperatives for small-scale loans.
- Form a group to monitor and resolve eve-teasing/ harassment of women, children and old people.
- Form a group to restore and publicise local art-forms like weaving/dyeing, maandna, folk songs, old manuscripts, etc.
- Form age/gender-specific groups for collective yoga/meditation in a community, society, hostel, etc.
- Form a group to restore wells/step wells/ponds or other similar water sources.

The University Science Instrumentation Centre (USIC) at the University of Rajasthan, established in the late 1970s with initial support from the University Grants Commission (UGC), plays a crucial role in academic and industrial research by providing advanced

instrumentation facilities. The Centre's primary objectives are to house high-end research instruments and offer specialized instrumentation services for spectral, thermal, chemical, and microstructural analysis. It supports internal and external researchers, including faculty, scholars, and students, with critical tools for scientific research.

The USIC is equipped with sophisticated instruments such as SQUID, SEM, TEM, GC Mass spectrometer, LC Mass spectrometer, and FTIR spectrometer. These instruments cater to the needs of University Science Departments and other institutions for research in areas like cancer research, virology, nanotechnology, and biotechnology. They are also available for future use by industry.

The Centre is dedicated to enhancing the quality of scientific publications and promoting experimental research. Its thrust areas include nanomaterial characterization and the magnetization of Nano and bulk materials. USIC's infrastructure features major research facilities.

### **Vision**

Scientific instruments may be usefully regarded as the capital goods of scientific research. That is to say, the conduct of scientific research generally requires some antecedent investment in specific equipment to enhance the ability to observe and measure specific categories of natural phenomena. In due course of time, UOR-USIC may play its role in enhancing quality publications and also encourage more people to go for experimental research for practical applications.

To attract the diversified Jainological studies the University also accommodated the study of source material, ideas, thoughts, literature and history of Jainism to be studied as special papers in the regular courses of the Department of the Sanskrit, Philosophy and History with the co-operation and guidance of the person occupying the chair in Jainology. In view of this decision the PG classes in Jain Studies are being taken with PG departments of History, Sanskrit and Philosophy of the University and the faculty of the Centre has been associated with them ever since the establishment of the Centre.

The Indira Gandhi Centre was granted the status of a Department of the University of Rajasthan, Jaipur on December 31, 1997. One-year P.G. Diploma courses in Human Ecology, Environmental Studies and Population Studies were introduced in 1984-85. Ranked as the second-best among 66 HRDCS in India in 2012 by the NAAC peer review committee, the Centre conducts Faculty Induction and Orientation Programmes for new teachers, Refresher Courses for in-service teachers, Short Term Courses, and Summer/Winter Schools/Webinars on multidisciplinary themes. It also offers special programmes such as Academic Administrators' Workshops, Principals' Meets, and training for Non-Teaching Staff. Monthly, it conducts 2 NEP orientation and sensitization programmes, training faculty members on the New Education Policy 2020; 937 faculty members were trained in three months. Since its inception, the HRDC has organized 379 Refresher Courses, 113 Orientation Programmes, 28 Short Term Courses, 03 Workshops, 3 Summer Schools, 2 Winter Schools, and 03 Webinars. Special events include a Principal's Meet, an Academic Administrator's Workshop, and an Interaction Programme for Ph.D. Scholars. The centre has completed 07 online Faculty Induction Programmes under the GURU-DAKSHATA scheme and 04 NEP Programmes, and organized 10 Faculty Induction Programmes under the RUSA scheme. Approximately 23,000 participants have benefited from these courses. The Centre is a national hub of academic activities, hosting resource persons from various fields across India. Participants come from across India, including remote areas like Pondicherry, Mizoram, Nagaland, Andaman and Nicobar Islands, and Sikkim. MMTTC features three well-equipped AC Seminar Halls, a state-of-the-art Computer Lab, a library with 5800 books and various periodicals, and a Guest House with 30 twin-bed rooms, modern facilities, and a common recreation room. Its philosophy emphasizes the holistic development of teachers, focusing on

their role as agents of socio-economic change and national development, and encourages them to mentor students and promote ethical values.

The students are free to visit and study their subject with the help of e-tutorials and e-texts available. The e-content comprised of contents submitted and uploaded in various disciplines viz. Science, Arts, Commerce, Law, Humanities, Social Science, etc. This e-content helped to connect the learners and teachers during the COVID-19 duration.

Swayam, an esteemed platform for online education, features a diverse array of modules developed by expert educators. Each module is meticulously crafted to deliver high-quality content and facilitate effective learning experiences.

### b. Infonet Centre

**Director:** Dr. S.K. Gupta

**Dy. Directore:** Dr. Dalpat Meena

The Infonet Centre at the University of Rajasthan is the technical backbone, managing the Campus Wide Area Network, Wi-Fi Network, website maintenance, mail servers, result servers, and research servers. It plays a crucial role in providing access to digital resources and advancing the university's technology infrastructure using open-source software and the Linux-Apache-MySQL/Perl/PHP (LAMP) platform. The Centre collaborates with the Campus Wide Area Network (CWAN), known as RUN (Rajasthan University Network), which uses Gigabit Ethernet Technology with Optical Fiber Backbone for high-speed connectivity across the campus, and the National Knowledge Network (NKN), which offers ultra-high-speed internet to institutions across India. The Centre ensures compliance with NKN policies to support advanced studies and research. Its goal is to enhance academic excellence and facilitate knowledge dissemination, aiming for seamless access to resources and enriched academic experiences. Best practices include in-house web application development and maintenance, continuous improvement of applications, and securing services with SSL and TLS encryption. The Centre's infrastructure features Blade Servers and SAN solutions for data management, modern networking with RUN and NKN, and facilities for academic functions like video conferencing.

### University Web Servers

One of the core features of Infonet Centre's services is that all of its websites are SSL and TLS enabled. SSL stands for Secure Sockets Layer, while TLS stands for Transport Layer Security. Both protocols are used to encrypt data that is transmitted over the internet, providing an extra layer of security against hackers and other cyber threats. SSL and TLS are widely used across the internet, and they have become the de facto standard for securing web traffic. ### a. **Central Library**

Libraries are vital educational hubs that provide essential resources and services for learning and research. They offer access to a wealth of information and preserve valuable cultural and historical documents, supporting academic growth and intellectual development. The Rajasthan University Library, located near the main gate of the University. The Library subscribes to current physical journals across various subjects and offers access to over 3165 e-journals through the e-Shodh Sindhu Consortium. A new building, named Dr. BR Ambedkar Library, has been constructed as an extension of the Rajasthan University Library with financial support from the UGC under the UPE grant and will soon be operational. In addition to book lending, the Library provides several services, including Reference Service, Reprographic Service, E-Journals online accessibility, Internet and Wi-Fi facilities, Research Reference Guidance Service, Braille Service for visually impaired persons, OPAC service, and RFID

facility. The books are classified into various categories such as general books, textbooks, reference books, RUSA books, theses, and reports. The Rajasthan University Library's goal and vision include expanding services based on e-resources and Web-OPAC services. The library boasts a rich collection of old documents known as 'The Abu Collection', which includes Government reports, gazetteers, and other publications dating back to the early 19th Century, valuable for historians. The Abu Collection is now available in digitized format in the National Digital Library. The Library also maintains a notable Micro-form Collection, featuring microfilms and microfiches.

The Library operates every day of the year, except for the following holidays: 26th January (Republic Day), 15th August (Independence Day), Dhulandi, Dussehra, Govardhan Pooja (the day after Deepawali), and on special occasions by order of the Director.

Book borrowing facility is available to all faculty, research scholars, students and University staff. RFID technology is used for book's security and RFID Smart Cards are issued to Central Library members for automated circulation. Only general books will be issued, but reference books, rare books, theses & dissertations, loose/bound issues of periodicals and such

other reference materials are only for consultation within the Central library. Borrowers must satisfy themselves about the physical condition of the books before borrowing otherwise, they will be held responsible for any damage or mutilation noticed later or at the time of returning. Circulation staff in the Central library will also assist you in locating items in the stack area and related matters.

#### **2. Planning and Scheduling:**

Development of maintenance schedules for routine and preventive maintenance. Prioritization of urgent repairs to ensure the safety and functionality of the buildings.

#### **3. Budgeting and Cost Estimation:**

Preparation of cost estimates for repairs and maintenance work.

#### **4. Coordination with Contractors:**

Liaising with contractors and vendors for specialized services such as electrical, plumbing, or structural repairs. Ensuring compliance with government regulations, quality standards, and safety protocols.

**5. Documentation and Reporting:**

Maintaining detailed records of inspections, repairs, and maintenance activities. Preparing reports for senior management on building conditions, maintenance needs, and completed work.

**7. Emergency Response:**

Quick response to emergencies like structural failures, leaks, or electrical hazards to prevent further damage or safety risks. The engineering office ensures university buildings are safe, functional, and well-maintained, supporting the overall infrastructure of public services.

4. Withholding of any document
5. Demand of money in excess of that specified to be charged
6. Reservation of seats in admission to different categories of students
7. Non-payment or delay in payment of Scholarships or financial aid
8. Delay by the institution in the conduct of examinations, or declaration of results
9. Failure by the institution to provide student amenities as set out in the prospectus
10. Non-transparent or unfair practices adopted by the institution for the evaluation of students.
11. Delay in, or denial of, the refund of fees due to a student who withdraws admission within the time mentioned in the prospectus
12. Complaints of alleged discrimination of students from the Scheduled Castes, the Scheduled Tribes, Other Backward Classes, Women, Minorities, or persons with disabilities categories.
13. Denial of quality education as promised at the time of admission.

**g. CDC (College Development Council)**

The Collage Development Council (CDC) was established by the University in 1978 under the UGC scheme to ensure proper planning and development of its affiliated and constituent Colleges (Govt., Non-Govt., and Constituent), improve higher education standards, and enhance faculty quality. The CDC invites proposals from Colleges under sections 2(f) and 12-B of the UGC Act, 1956, and recommends them to the UGC for approval. Currently, 108 Colleges affiliated with the University of Rajasthan, Jaipur are recognized by the UGC under section 2(f) & 12-B, and 36 Colleges under section 2(f). Among these, 04 Colleges have CPE status and 02 have Autonomous Status. UGC Schemes for College Teachers include Faculty Improvement Programmes, Major/Minor Research Projects, and UGC Schemes for Students such as Conferences/Workshops/Seminars, Travel Grants, and Day Care Centers. UGC provides

financial assistance for various schemes, including Development for Colleges, Coaching for NET for SC/ST/OBC (non-creamy layer) & Minorities, construction/renovation of Academic buildings, purchase of Books & Journals, Equipment, Colleges with Potential for Excellence (CPE), Women Hostels, Golden Jubilee/Centenary grants, Additional Grants, Infrastructure Rejuvenation, 'Catch-up' grants, and support for Colleges in Rural/Remote/Border/Hill/Tribal Areas, and Backward Areas. The Coordinator, CDC assists Colleges with proposals and guidance, monitors UGC grant utilization, and recommends proposals to the UGC based on the guidelines on [www.ugc.ac.in](http://www.ugc.ac.in). The CDC plays a key role in improving infrastructure and benefiting faculty and students.

#### **h. International Cooperation Cell**

International Cooperation Cell established in 2007, works to facilitate cooperation between the University of Rajasthan and International universities. It coordinates, negotiates and partners with International Universities to develop exchange programmes for faculty and students. From 2007 onwards, 61 mobilities of students and Faculty have taken place. Out of these, 21 students and 08 faculty members have come from foreign Universities to the University of Rajasthan and 20 students and 02 Faculty members have gone from the University of Rajasthan to Paul Valery Montpellier-III, France; Jean Moulin Lyon-III, France; Aix Marseilles University, France, University of Montreal, Quebec, Canada, and Novosibirsk State Technical University, Russia. In the last academic year, four students of the ELLCS department pursued their one semester as exchange students at Jean Moulin Lyon 3, Lyon and Aix Marseilles University, France. MOUs with Universiti Teknologi MARA, Malaysia was signed in 2022.

#### **i. IPR Cell (Intellectual Property Right)**

The IPR cell of the University of Rajasthan is situated in the ECH building. The Intellectual Property Rights (IPR) cell in a university plays a crucial role in fostering an environment of innovation and protecting the intellectual creations of its faculty, students, and researchers. The IPR cell is instrumental in ensuring that the university's intellectual assets are appropriately managed, protected, and leveraged for maximum benefit. The IPR policy formulated by the IPR cell was adopted by the Department of Science and Technology, Government of Rajasthan, Jaipur as state IPR policy for all Universities in 2019. The IPR cell organizes workshops, seminars, and training sessions to educate the university community about the importance of intellectual property rights, including patents, trademarks, copyrights, and trade secrets. It works with academic departments to integrate IPR education into the curriculum, ensuring that students understand the basics of intellectual property as part of their academic training. The IPR cell assists researchers in identifying potentially patentable

inventions and guides them through the patent application process. It provides legal assistance to protect intellectual property from infringement and manages disputes related to IP rights.

**j. Liaison Office (SC/ST/PWD & OBC)**

Established in 2019 following University Syndicate Resolution No. 2-4.10, the Liaison Office ensures the rights of SC/ST/PWD and OBC students within the university's constitutional bodies. The office is responsible for the proper implementation of reservation rules in admissions across undergraduate, postgraduate, M.Phil., Ph.D., diploma, and certificate courses. It also ensures the inclusion of reserved categories in recruitment for teaching, non-teaching, technical, and other positions, and maintains a uniform policy for participation in university and regulatory committees.

**Performance Management for Staff:** Transparent Appraisal System: A transparent and well-defined Annual Confidential Report (ACR) system evaluates the performance of non-teaching staff. Promotions are conducted by duly constituted committees following the University's

established rules and regulations. A standard mechanism committee also addresses grievances lodged by staff members, ensuring a fair and transparent process.

**Healthcare:** UoR prioritizes the well-being of its staff by offering medical care through established Centers for Allopathic, Ayurvedic and Homeopathic treatment. These facilities cater to the needs of teaching and non-teaching staff, their dependents and students. Free medicines, regular check-ups, health camps, health awareness lectures and yoga sessions promote preventive healthcare measures.

**Sports and Recreation:** UoR fosters a healthy lifestyle by providing access to on-campus sports facilities like a swimming pool, a multipurpose gym, playgrounds, and courts for various games. These facilities encourage physical activity and promote staff well-being.

**Employee-Friendly Policies:** UoR offers a range of employee-friendly policies and benefits, including medical reimbursements, comprehensive health insurance for staff and their family members, advances/loans, and leave benefits (including childcare leave), as per standard guidelines. Social security measures like provident fund, gratuity and pension plans provide financial security for employees after retirement. UoR, on compassionate grounds, considers employment opportunities for an eligible dependent family member in the unfortunate event of an employee's untimely demise.

**Additional Facilities:** UoR provides on-campus residential accommodation, a working women's hostel, faculty clubs, guest house facilities, a community center, and multiple banking, postal, shopping complexes and canteen facilities for adding convenience to daily chores both for faculty and staff. Educational facilities include play school, pre-primary school, primary school and crèche services to support working parents.

**c. University Press**

The University Press is a small unit registered under the Factory Act Established on 1962, November 1st. The press conducts various types of printing works allotted to it. The press possesses one mechanical composing unit, one offset printing machine, two automatic printing machines, three machines and one cylinder machine. Most of the work done in the Press is related either to the academic side or to the examination. For the Examination branch, it prints Application Forms, Examination Programmes, Marks-sheets, Roll Lists, Tabulation Registers, Headings and various other types of forms related to it. Printing of English versions of the degrees in all faculties is also done by the Press. The Press prints and supplies about 75 types of printed stationary items. These are stored in the Press and supplied to various departments and constituent colleges of the University during the whole year. These items include various types of Registers, Forms, Receipts Books, File Covers, and File Boards, etc. The Press also caters to the need for various forms required towards affiliation of colleges. It also executes the Printing of Journals of the University South Asia Study Centre, Mass Communication, Department of ABST, Business administration, EAFM, S.S.R.C. Economics, Magazines like Glimpses, Booklet of various conferences organized by the departments, Reference Books for the Centre for Mass Communication, etc. Successful efforts have been made during the past 53 years to increase the income of revenue and curtailment of expenditures. There has been no labour trouble and the employer-employee relationship has remained cordial throughout the period under report. The workers participated in all the cultural and welfare activities as well as in sports conducted by the union or the administration from time to time. Student of Mass Communication and the Department of Home Science also visit the press for their paper and project. Looking to the growing demand for modern printing from all the departments, sections and constituted colleges of the University, the Press has ample scope for development and replacement of its existing old machinery. One Offset machine, one plate-making machine and two computers were installed from the fund received from the U.G.C in its X Plan and one paper-cutting machine was also installed in the Press. Now the year of 2016 press needs One Small Colour Offset Machine, a Photo State cum Scanner Machine, One Computer 1-5, and one large printer for betterment of the Press.

**d. Institutional Perspective Plan (2018-2028)**

dual degree in converging technologies, and noted the institution's resource mobilization for research. The feedback received from the NAAC assessments has laid the groundwork for significant improvements and future strategies.

The Institutional Perspective Plan aims to align the university's strategic goals with the recommendations from the NAAC peer team and other regulatory bodies. The plan emphasizes academic excellence, research and innovation, strengthening physical and digital infrastructure, student support and career development, environmental sustainability, and community engagement.

### **Major Thrust Areas:**

- 1. Academic Excellence:** The university remains committed to maintaining its status as a leader in higher education in Rajasthan by continuously updating curricula, introducing new interdisciplinary courses, and modernizing teaching methodologies. Academic audits will ensure quality control, while faculty recruitment will address the student-teacher ratio challenge. The Board of Studies (BoS) will also be strengthened by including industry experts, ensuring students are prepared for the modern workforce.
- 2. Research and Innovation:** Enhancing the university's research capacity is a primary objective. The focus will be on increasing high-impact research publications, securing funded research projects, and promoting innovation ecosystems through incubation centers and startups. Collaboration with national and international institutes will also be prioritized to position the university as a center for cutting-edge research.
- 3. Strengthening Physical and Digital Infrastructure:** The plan includes significant investments in new physical infrastructure, including the construction of laboratories, hostels, academic units, and staff quarters. Existing facilities will undergo renovation and maintenance, and the university aims for complete digitization of its examination system. This will not only improve efficiency but also ensure transparency. A focus on sports and recreational facilities will support holistic student development.
- 4. Student Support and Career Development:** Enhancing student services is a key priority. The university will establish a Career Hub to facilitate career planning, internships, and entrepreneurship. Placement programs and career workshops will improve student employability. Other initiatives include strengthening the Grievance Redressal Cell, offering remedial courses, and promoting Group Insurance Schemes. The Student Advisory Bureau (SAB) will also be enhanced to offer guidance and support to students.

5. **Environmental Sustainability:** In line with global sustainability goals, the university will implement several green initiatives, such as the development of a Sewage Treatment Plant, Miyawaki afforestation, and the installation of solar panels. Water conservation through rainwater harvesting and the use of energy-efficient equipment such as LED lighting will also be a priority. The university plans to conduct Green Audits regularly to ensure adherence to environmental goals.
6. **Community Engagement:** The University will extend its societal outreach by adopting five villages over the next decade, building upon its successful partnership with Bagariya village. The focus will be on areas such as education, health, and women's empowerment. Through NSS, NCC, and other departments, more than 300 community outreach programs will be organized annually to foster social responsibility and student leadership.
